There will always be irons in the fire. There are a few upcoming highlights:

A ninety-five million-dollar SA-TOC (Single Award Task Order Contract) is currently in Sources Sought. This contract is being solicited by Savannah District Corps of Engineers and will service Ft. Benning and the Southeaster Region. We are excited by this opportunity and will be fairly aggressive in pursuing it.

A one hundred million-dollar MA-TOC (Multiple Award Task Order Contract) is currently in Sources Sought. This contract is being solicited by Fort Bragg

MICC and will be a horizontal construction contract. We feel we have partners in and around the

Fort Bragg area that will enable Pyramid to not only win this contract but execute it with a high level of success.

Pyramid has become a name well known by Federal Contracting Officers throughout the Southeast region. We have defined quality, partnering and dedication.

Pyramid has been extremely successful proposing and landing Federal opportunities throughout the Southeastern region. Currently we are operating multi-year IDIQ contracts out of Cherry Point, Camp Lejeune, Shaw AFB, Fort Jackson and FLETC (Brunswick campus). Within the last month, we have been notified of additional multi-year IDIQ awards at Parris Island and Moody AFB. This does not mean we are satisfied as we are always looking for the next opportunity. This is one of the reasons our team has grown so fast. In addition to IDIQ contracts, Pyramid has successfully won multiple sole source contracts at Fort Bragg, State Parks and Shaw AFB. We have also pursued work as a subcontractor for other Federal Contractors. To date we've been awarded multiple contracts that exceed sixteen million dollars. As a result of the massive increase in contracts, we've had to increase our staff and offices. Currently we have offices at Camp Lejeune, Shaw AFB, FLETC and soon to be Parris Island.

The Bradley Work Center Renovation Project

The Bradley Work Center was originally built in 1936 as Civilian Conservation Corps "Camp 7": It currently serves as a home office for a crew of five U.S. Forest Service members managing wildlife and fires in the nearby National Forest. The building was originally constructed with a large open floorplan and shiplap siding; in the early 1950s the building got interior renovations updating the layout, and lovely Forest Service green asbestos shingle siding. Since then, the building had not been touched until Pyramid was contracted in November 2018 to give the building and its occupants the major upgrade they were long overdue for.

The project kicked off with the abatement of the asbestos shingles, followed by replacing sections of rotted wood beneath and weatherproofing the building before installing new windows, soffit, gutters, shingle roof, and vinyl lap siding. During that process, the building's electrical service was upgraded and brought up to code. The building's location and erosion over the years had created pooling next to the building which not only put the foundation at risk but was leaking into the building through the garage door: Pyramid re-graded the area to pull water away from the building and eliminated this problem. The interior renovation included all new flooring, constructing a new wall to divide an office, and total renovation of the only bathroom. The project was considered a success by all and a new relationship was formed. The community also expressed their gratitude for updating and preserving such a historic building.





Workforce Safety Training

Promoting Health and Safety In The Workplace

All jobsite employees receive weekly safety training, with Superintendents receiving additional safety training monthly. During these training sessions employees are encouraged to participate by making suggestions to improve safety techniques for their current assigned task. When a task changes, a preparatory safety meeting is held followed by a post safety meeting. This allows the employees to voice their opinion on how the task was conducted and discuss if there is a need to change or improve our policy or procedures.

With management asking "Why" first, what and how followed easily. I'm proud to say that Pyramid Contracting has one of the finest safety programs in the industry and is 100% committed to protecting our greatest asset, our employees. It is a pleasure to serve on such a safe and energetic team.

Construction's "Fatal Four"

Out of 4,674 worker fatalities in private industry in 2017, 971 or 20.7% were in construction - that's, one in five! The leading causes of private sector worker deaths in the construction industry were falls, followed by struck by object, electrocution, and caughtin/between_alls - 381 out of 971 total deaths in construction in CY

There are many employees who ignore alerts or advanced

warnings, and as a result a number of workplace injuries or fatalities occur.

Take appropriate precautions while using machinery or any other tool, instead of taking shortcuts. Taking shortcuts is one of the biggest reasons behind workplace injury and loss.

These "Fatal Four" were responsible for more than half (59.9%) the construction worker deaths in 2017. Eliminating the Fatal Four would save 582 workers'
